Faculty Research Seminar at School of Law





In the series of Internal Faculty Seminars, on 27th April 2024 (Saturday), a seminar was organized by the School of Law on the topic "Climate Justice: Balancing Environmental Rights and Social Equity - A Recap". The topic was presented by Mr. Anurag Sharma, Assistant Professor, School of Law. This seminar enabled the faculties to understand the critical concept of climate justice. It's a framework for addressing climate change that emphasizes fairness and equity, recognizing the unequal burdens this crisis places on different communities. In this seminar, Mr. Anurag started the discussion with how climate change threatens our fundamental right to a clean and healthy environment. Rising sea levels, extreme weather events, and disruptions to ecosystems pose a significant threat to all. However, the impacts are not evenly distributed. Marginalized communities, including low-income populations, people of color, and indigenous groups, often withstand the most of climate change despite contributing the least to greenhouse gas emissions. This highlights the need for social equity in climate solutions. Finally, he concluded with the recent judgement of the Supreme Court on 21st March 2024 i.e., M.K.Ranjitsinh & Ors V. Union of India where the court formulated new constitutional right to be free from the adverse effects of climate change by drawing upon Article 21 & Article 14 of the constitution. The Seminar ended with a question-answer session.



Faculty Research Seminar by SoL



On 24th May 2024, a faculty seminar was organized under the aegis of the School of Law on the topic "History of Land Revenue Administration in Kumaon". The event was a continuation of the Internal Faculty Seminars organized by the School of Law. The presentation in this regard was made by Mr. Anupam Upreti, Assistant Professor, School of Law.

The presentation incorporated a discussion on the system of land revenue administration under the rule of the Chand Dynasty. Apart from this, the contributions of Kumaon Commissioners George William Traill, John Hallot Batton, and Henry Ramsay were also part and parcel of the discussion. The Revenue Police System of Uttarakhand was also discussed. Lastly, the current situation in land revenue administration was discussed, this session ended with a high note of question answer round.

Faculty Research Seminar on 'Resistance of Indian Soldiery in the British Indian Army' by SoL



The Faculty Research Seminar was organized in the School of Law on 14.6.2024 Recounting the Bengal Native Infantry (1757-1856 CE). The history of the Indian independence movement from 1757 to 1947 is marked by persistent resistance against British colonial rule. This resistance evolved over time and was significantly influenced by Indian soldiers in the Bengal Native Infantry (BNI). Initially crucial to establishing British control, these soldiers later became key figures in opposing it. Early resistance, driven by grievances such as administrative malpractice, cultural insensitivity, and hierarchical

erosion, manifested in mutinies and rebellions, culminating in the Indian Rebellion of 1857. This rebellion, a pivotal event in India's struggle for independence, united various groups against British dominance. The research paper is structured into four sections: the first examines the significance of the 1857 Rebellion, the second explores the East India Company's recruitment practices, the third details specific instances of armed resistance, and the fourth analyses the economic, social, and cultural causes of these rebellions. By studying these aspects, the paper aims to highlight the role of Indian soldiers in the anti-colonial struggle and enhance understanding of India's fight for freedom. The session ended on a high note with a question-answer session. The activities included multi-dimensional methods of understanding any problem, categorically distributed across six groups comprised of faculty members, Deans and the honourable VC himself.

Faculty Development Program (FDP) on "Creative Pedagogy: Education Next"



In congruence with the workshop that commenced on Day 1 & Day 2 was also full of activities deliberated by the faculty with the esteemed leadership of the honourable guest Dr. Pavan Soni. Along with the creative exercises like mind mapping, adapting with the blue ocean strategy of problem solving, the session was carried forward with the valuable lecture on SPRC technique, Lateral thinking, and so on. This practice helped faculty address pain, manage overwhelming thoughts, and cope with mental and physical challenges. Mr. Dhammy's concluding lecture highlighted the importance of recognizing depression, anxiety, and distress to maintain productivity. The VC and Deans honored Mr. Dhammy for his contributions. In the afternoon, Dr. Jitendra Mishra from Jain University led a virtual session on Outcome-Based Education (OBE). He explored its integration with existing programs and emphasized aligning Program Educational Objectives (PEOs) and Program Outcomes (POs) with NEP 2020. Dr. Mishra provided hands-on training in CO/PO mapping, enhancing faculty understanding of OBE principles. On Day 5, the faculty development program focused on Generative Artificial Intelligence, led by Bangalore-based Business Consultant Mr. Lokesh Venkataswamy. The day began with a stimulating warm-up exercise to enhance creativity. Mr. Venkataswamy's lecture explored how innovative thinking led to successful business ventures even during global recessions, emphasizing strategic innovation and transforming customer experiences. The afternoon was dedicated to hands-on sessions in the computer lab, where participants worked with ChatGPT and other Generative AI tools.
